



Welcome to the Winter edition of the LRSN newsletter! This edition is packed with news of donations and the fundraising efforts of both the LRSN team and some of our fantastic supporters, so I wanted to take a moment to tell you all why each and every person who supports LRSN is so very important to us.

LRSN is a community; a community of volunteers, business friends and supporters, who work together in response to the challenges faced by farming and rural families across Lincolnshire. The support of our community is absolutely essential in so many ways: through fundraising to help safeguard and maintain our services; through offering specialist and expert advice; through supporting our events and hosting the Health Hut; through raising awareness of the support we can offer, and in so many other ways too numerous to list.

This is particularly important at the current time, as unfortunately, there is a greater need for our services than ever before. We are seeing a significant increase in the number of people reaching out to us for support and are currently supporting 183 farming families, compared to 186 in the whole of last year. Our helpline is also busier, and we have already taken 127 helpline calls since April, compared to 90 calls in the whole of last year.

I am humbled by the support we receive from our community, whether that is through people giving their time as a volunteer, making a donation, growing a moustache as part of a fundraising campaign or simply by passing our helpline card onto a friend or neighbour. If, like me, you feel inspired by the amazing supporters and champions of LRSN featured in this edition of our newsletter, and you would like to find out how you can get involved, please do get in touch.
