

# Focus on Urology, **Blood Pressure and** Alcohol awareness

Every month our nurses have a specific health focus, we want to highlight this in our newsletter and on social media to raise awareness.

#### **AUGUST is Urology Disease** awareness month

This month the focus is on raising awareness of urology disease which includes cancers of the kidney, bladder, prostate and male reproductive system as well as chronic and life disrupting diseases such as incontinence, kidney stones and urine infections.

Many men will experience trouble having a pee as they age. An enlarged prostate is a common cause of this, it is a non-cancerous growth of the prostate, associated with ageing. Around 40% of men over 60 will be having problems having a pee. Simple things like drinking less in an evening and cutting down on caffeine and alcohol may help. There is also medication to help shrink the prostate and finally surgery. So, seek help from your GP.


Prostate cancer is the most common type of cancer found in men. It is most common in men over the age of 50, especially those with a close family history of it. 1 in 8 men will be diagnosed with it at some point in their lives. This risk increases to 1 in 4 for Afro-Caribbean men.

A few tests and checks will be needed to diagnose correctly so see your GP if you have difficulty passing urine, have the sudden urge to pee, are peeing more frequently especially at night, cannot completely empty your bladder or you see blood in your pee.

The colour of your pee can be a sign that you need to drink more water to avoid dehydration or you may have an infection.

Blood in your pee is not usually caused by anything serious but you must get it checked out.

#### Remember: Blood in your pee? See your GP



#### **SEPTEMBER 'Know your** numbers' blood pressure

FACT: 1 in 3 adults in UK has high blood pressure BUT 1 in 9 adults has high blood pressure and does not know it!

#### Why is it important to know?

High blood pressure increases your risk of having a stroke or heart attack. It is also a risk factor for kidney disease, dementia and other illnesses.

#### What can increase my risk of high blood pressure?

- A family history of high BP, heart attack or stroke
- African, Caribbean or Asian descent
- Increasing age
- Other health problems and some medications

#### How can I lower my blood pressure?

- Fat less salt
- Eat less fat and sugar
- Eat more fruit and veg
- Cut down alcohol and caffeine
- Lose weight
- Be more active, five times 30 mins a week exercise
- Stop smoking
- Identify and control your stress triggers

#### What are the numbers to aim for?

- 120/80 or less = optimum level
- 121/81 to 139/89 = make lifestyle changes to lower your BP
- 140/90 or higher = if consistently at or above this level then you may have high blood pressure. See your GP and make lifestyle changes mentioned earlier.

#### Make time to see our nurses for a blood pressure check up!
